### From the Executive Director

Dear Friends:

Like all other organizations, GSE was significantly impacted over the last two years by the Covid pandemic – by travel restrictions, by hospital facilities that we previously used being needed to treat sick Covid patients, and by needed focus around the world devoted to addressing pandemic related health care needs. However, as I reflect on the last year, I am reminded and inspired by the dedicated team of GSE volunteers committed to making a difference throughout the world. Be it through their amazing efforts to help local and national COVID efforts, or their continued commitment to increasing access to surgical care throughout the world, I am thankful for this incredible team of healthcare heroes.



Despite these challenges, GSE had an amazing year and I am excited to share some highlights with you.

We founded Global Surgical Expedition nearly ten years ago because I believe it is unacceptable that 30 to 50 percent of the world's population lacks access to basic surgical care. It is not all right that a significant percentage of deaths in these countries could be prevented by routine surgeries that you and I take for granted – but aren't available to millions of people.

I think you agree, because when GSE committed to changing these statistics one life-changing surgery at a time, you joined with us. Because you believe that simple surgical care is a human right, GSE has saved lives, restored quality of life, and enabled people to return to work and support a family.

With your support, we have now surpassed **400** surgeries in Belize and Rwanda – and in the year ahead we're looking to expand to more countries, including Botswana, Guatemala, and Jamaica. With you as a partner, we have built a dedicated group of medical volunteers, with over **40** physicians, nurses, technicians, and therapists participating in our trips. And at a cost of **less than \$1,000 per surgery**, we have cost-effectively delivered this care.

But our vision is more far-reaching than simply providing surgery. Our goal is to make surgical care sustainable around the world. We do this through a commitment to our 4 pillars for surgical care: providing surgeries and surgical infrastructure, performing global surgery research, advocacy, and global surgery education. Through this broad approach we can make a much bigger impact.

Take a look at all we've accomplished under each of these pillars – and please pay particular attention to the challenges we face in the coming year. I hope that you will feel proud to be part of this growing organization and the hundreds of lives that your support has helped to change. With your continued help, we can – we will – do so much more.

### Surgical Trips

While our surgical missions were largely suspended in early 2021 because of the pandemic, we transitioned to alternate models of assistance. We created virtual activities that focused foremost on clinical care and education. Our virtual lectures to healthcare providers in Rwanda have been very well-received and enabled health teams to carry out important urological care for patients.

This transition also focused on developing non-surgical strategies to treat or prevent surgical illness. In November, GSE traveled to Belize to begin an exciting two-year program to develop a pelvic floor therapy initiative. Our goal is to treat patients with pelvic floor disorders and to train local providers to deliver this care independently, so that surgery is not necessary in some cases! We are already seeing how this initiative has tremendous potential to improve the lives of a huge number of women.





In-country efforts remain vitally important and I'm happy to report that in November 2021, GSE completed its first surgical trip to Belize since the pandemic began, providing 31 surgeries to cure fistula, kidney stones, incontinence, prolapse, and many other urgent diseases. This trip took place only after a careful assessment of risks and benefits, balancing the unmet surgical need with potential negative impacts on hospital bed capacity, COVID transmission, and use of hospital resources. Despite the current complexity of setting up missions, our teams are excited to be back in the countries we serve and our goal is to resume our widespread surgical trips throughout Central America and Africa in 2022.

# Highlights

### 2 Research

GSE believes strongly in the need to perform global research. We do it to understand better ways to reach patients and provide surgery that makes a difference in their lives.

Our most recent project sought to understand the economic impact of urologic disease in Belize. We found that on average, patients reported a loss of 12% of their income due to related disability or physicians' appointments caused by their disease. For a woman, it might be urine leakage caused by fistula. For a man, untreated kidney stones might cause him to work fewer hours at his job as a farmer.

Can you imagine losing 12% of your annual income because you have no access to simple surgery that would cure your illness? Or the impact that this would have on you and your family? Providing one surgery to cure the disease can return 12% of lost income permanently to these patients, vastly improving quality of life and combatting poverty at the same time!

### 3 Education

A founding vision of GSE was to foster the next generation of global surgical leaders. We believe strongly in the need to stimulate and train medical students and residents in global surgery.

Part of this means providing international training experiences for residents (GSE's surgical teams have taken 11 residents with them to date) and GSE offers scholarships to make this possible. But we must do more to address the global lack of surgical care – and we are, by helping to train global surgery leaders by providing more formal educational opportunities and curricula.

In conjunction with the University of Virginia Global Health Leadership Track, GSE was proud to support the development of a formal certificate program in global surgery/urology. This year, the program celebrated its first resident graduate, Dr. Clint Yeaman. In this way, GSE is helping to create dedicated global surgery leaders who make global surgery a career rather than simply participating in sporadic missions.

### Advocacy

It is estimated that five billion people living in low and middle income countries (LMIC) lack access to safe and affordable surgical care and that 143 million additional surgeries are needed to save lives and prevent disability due to surgical disease. Advocacy is the cornerstone of generating the worldwide support needed to address this shortfall, which is why advocacy is one of the four pillars of GSE.

We participate in larger advocacy efforts as part of the G4 Alliance, a global group of more than 60 organizations across 160 countries, united in our efforts to advocate for access to SOTA care (surgical, obstetric, trauma, and anesthesia). GSE also advocates with our individual international partners. When we visited with numerous healthcare leaders across Belize to discuss COVID-related needs for our November mission, we reinforced awareness regarding urologic need and necessary program support.

In addition, our goal is to advocate through storytelling. From the beginning, GSE has believed in the power of stories and has focused much effort on public education. We create videos, articles, blogs, and other public awareness campaigns to educate the larger community to the need for surgical access. We have numerous videos on our site, including several documentaries that share the story of patients we have served.

### Other Notable Accomplishments



GSE traveled to Belize in September to meet with healthcare leaders and advocate for urologic and gynecologic care infrastructure in Belize.



GSE provided 2 resident scholarships supporting an international global surgery experience.



Dr. Rapp was the recipient of the 2 grants from the University of Virginia Center for Global Inquiry & Innovation to support global surgery research.



GSE presented our research on economic impact of urologic disease at two international urologic and gynecologic meetings.



Over 85% of funds donated go directly to the equipment and resources needed to send mission teams to underserved countries.




Our First Gala

# Bringing Pelvic Floor Health to Belize

Did you know that comprehensive pelvic floor therapy can treat urinary incontinence and actually prevent the need for surgery in a large number of women? Unfortunately, women in many countries have no access to specialized physical therapists that can provide this critical care.

In September, GSE began a two-year initiative to change that! Under the direction of Jeanice Mitchell and Michelle Little, GSE developed a therapy program and resources and have started to deliver this care throughout Belize. Over the two-year initiative, GSE plans to then train local providers to deliver this care themselves!







We anticipate sending **4 surgical teams** to **Belize** throughout 2022.



We are planning **two** pelvic floor physical therapy trips to **Belize** to continue providing preventative care and train local providers.



We are excited to announce a **new partner!** In 2022, we will send a team to begin surgical outreach efforts in **Botswana.** 



We are exploring several opportunities for new partners across **Central America** and **Asia**.
